



Secure Goat, Milk & Mohair Supply Plan In the Event of a Foot and Mouth Disease Outbreak

What is the Secure Goat, Milk & Mohair Supply Plan?

- It provides a workable business continuity plan for operations that are under movement restrictions but *not infected* with foot and mouth disease (FMD).
- It offers movement guidance ideas for owners, producers, haulers, packing/processing plants and officials managing the outbreak.
- It provides biosecurity and surveillance guidance for producers.

Business Continuity

How will the U.S. respond to a Foot and Mouth Disease (FMD) outbreak?

- Response will focus on stopping the spread of the animal disease.
- Control Areas will be set up around FMD infected and surrounding operations.
- Movement restrictions will be put in place for animals and animal products in the Control Areas.

Why is the Secure Goat, Milk & Mohair Supply Plan needed?

- It helps operations in Control Areas whose goats have no signs of FMD to continue to move goats.
- It limits lost income for operations, haulers, packers/processors and grocers.
- It maintains the supply of meat, milk, mohair and cashmere products to consumers.
